- #1 Each member is to live their life in such a way to bring glory and honor to the Head of the church.
- #2 Our attitude towards one another needs to be right humble, gentle, longsuffering, bearing with each other (supporting each other)
- #3 Each member has to work at it "endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit" each member has various likes, dislikes, backgrounds, talents and education you have to work at it to avoid conflict and division.
 - "from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by what every joint supplies, according to the effective working by which every part does its share, causes growth of the body for the edifying of itself in love." (Ephesians 4:16)
- #4 The bond is peace all saints are bound together like the ligaments that hold a human body together. Another phrase the Bible uses is "one accord"

"So continuing daily with one accord in the temple.." (Acts 2:46)

Unity can be achieved if each one of us puts forth the necessary effort, rallying round the word of God (Acts 2:42); each molding his/her life into the of Christ (Romans 8:29); bearing with each other all along the way (Galatians 6:2).

"Let us draw near with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who has promised is faithful: and let us con-sider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds, not forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another and all the more as you see the day drawing near" (Hebrews 10:22-25).

When we assemble together and worship God it is important to keep in mind that God is present. When we are in the midst of God, especially in our service unto Him, we must remember that He is our Creator and we must give Him due respect. In Exodus 3:1-5 we read of God communicating to Moses through the burning bush and in verse 5 God says, "Do not come near here; remove your sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." Like Moses, when we come together to worship God, or even in our individual worship, we must approach God with reverence and respect.

In John 4:24 we are told that "God is Spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth." This type of worship, which God requires of us, demands the inner self. We cannot just simply be in attendance for each worship service because that is not enough. "These people honor Me with their lips, yet their hearts are far from Me" (Matt. 15:8). We are to be attentive to every aspect of the worship service. We are to pray with those who lead the public prayers, we are to sing (Ephesians 5:19; Col. 3:16) out unto the Lord to praise Him. When the preacher be-gins his sermon it is not time to take a short nap, we should pay close attention to the words he speaks because he is revealing the commandments of God. If Jesus were the one speaking would you pay closer attention? Would you miss the opportunity to hear Him speak? If you say you would pay closer attention, then why? Is not the preacher presenting the teachings and words of Christ? "For we walk by faith, not by sight" (2 Corinthians 5:7). If you walk by faith then His spiritual presence will be just as important to us as His physical presence. Therefore, as we assemble together, we must worship with our whole self, from our hearts, so our worship may be found pleasing in the sight of God and encouraging to those we are worshipping with.
